

Some Fun Facts About New Years That You Never Knew You Needed to Know

- The celebration of New Year's Day dates back over 4,000 years to ancient Babylon.
- Eating 365 black-eyed peas is believed to bring good luck to each day in the new year.
- The first New Year's Day parade in the United States was held in Philadelphia in 1901.
- The tradition of kissing someone at midnight is believed to ward off loneliness in the upcoming year.
- Over 50 tons of trash are left in Times Square after New Year's Eve celebrations.
 - (About 3,000 pounds of that is confetti!)
- In many cultures, it is traditional to make noise at midnight on New Year's Eve to scare away evil spirits and bring good luck for the new year.
 - The tradition of setting off fireworks on New Year's Eve dates back to ancient China.
- The image of a baby representing the New Year dates back to ancient Greece and Rome, symbolizing rebirth and the start of a new cycle.
- In countries like India and Israel, it is common to plant trees on New Year's Day as a symbol of renewal and hope for the future.
